Finding and Affirming Hope in the 21st Century

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
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"Yet when I hoped for good, evil came; when I looked for light, then came darkness."


Who turned that switch on?

Without the energy and warmth radiating from the sun to sustain all the plants, insects, animals and human beings, life would simply stop on our planet.

Today, while a majority of scientists have come to dismiss the existence of a Creator, one fundamental question still remains: who turned on the switch of the vital source of energy of the sun?





For modern and educated men, everything that happened before their own time is suspected of belonging to the world of superstition and myths.

It is true that the imagination of philosophers has often gone wild as they tried to figure out the meaning of the universe. Hindu cosmology, for example, pictured the earth as being supported by elephants, which in turn were supported by a giant tortoise.

China, Egypt, Greece and other cultures may have developed similar imaginative stories, but there was so little truth in their stories that they are now completely buried in obscurity.

But how could they know that?

Browsing through the vast catalog of ancient mythology, a serious enquirer may still find some surprising truths in some of the oldest records of man's history.

The book of Job, considered to be one of the oldest books of the Bible along with the first eleven chapters of Genesis, viewed the Earth this way: "He spreads out the northern skies over empty space, he suspends the earth over nothing" (Job 26:7)
Too bad for the tortoise and elephants...

In the first chapter of the book of Genesis, we read that statement: "And God said, 'Let there be **light**,' and there was **light**." (Genesis 1:3)

It is rather significant that this book written more than 3,500 years ago begins by acknowledging that light is the most fundamental form of energy.

Today, we know that everything in the physical universe is energy in one form or another (heat, sound, electricity) and that even matter is a form of energy. In describing the creation of the world in Genesis 1, the Bible contains no errors or exaggerations.



Traveling at light speed

Camels may not be the fastest animals, but the book of Job, written at a time when they were widely used as cargos, contains remarkable modern questions from God about the nature of **light**.

"What is the way to the abode of **light**? And where does darkness reside? Can you take them to their places? Do you know the paths to their dwellings?" (Job 38:19-20)

"Do you send the lightning bolts on their way? Do they report to you, 'Here we are'?" (Job 38:35)

From these, we learn that **light** is always moving while darkness is static. And we may even have a hint about its ability to carry messages. As our modern devices, transmitting texts and pictures by lightning-fast electronic communications do by transforming electrical energy into sound and **light** energy.

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
